“ It was sad news to report recently to those who served at D Team 509th United States Army Artillery Detachment in Borgholzhausen, Germany in the mid-1970s that Coy R. Scroggins died on 20 August 2019 in Oregon from cancer. It was his 71st birthday. We all knew him as Lt. Scroggins Team Commander and it was his first command position in what proved to be a long and distinguished military career. This was a Nike Hercules nuclear missile detachment and we worked closely with the soldiers of the 120th Squadron of the Royal Netherlands Air Force in a NATO base in West Germany. We only had three officers and, at most, 27 enlisted soldiers at that time—an interesting and challenging assignment with great responsibilities as well and Coy was masterful as Team Commander.

One of his last posts was back in Germany at Heidelberg as a full colonel when he retired. He was the finest officer I ever met and a truly great human being in every respect.

Coy and Kathy were great friends to my wife, Marie, and me in the Army at Borgholzhausen just after Krista Scroggins was born in 1973. Coy and I served together for just over one year but he was one of those people who has a great impact on those he meets that often lasts a lifetime! I confess to having at least a little impact on his love of golf as we became golfing buddies at the British Airbase course at Gutersloh nearby where the bunkers on the course were REAL bunkers and a local ground rule stated, “NO teeing off when jets are on the runway ! “ He and Kathy shared generously with us a mutual friendship with some of the Dutch officers and their wives with whom we served as well as a developing love of European antiques, especially old clocks. Coy taught me how to repair clocks and how to find them first as cast-offs on German junk days and at local flea markets. We returned the favor when Coy asked us on our first trip to England to attend the British Open in the summer of 1974 to “pick up an English Grandfather clock” for them during our trip. He told us how to negotiate with the locals who always appreciated cheap American cigars and cigarettes to seal the deal. We bought two clocks—one for us and one for Coy and Kathy and took them back with us to Germany. And, as I recall, both the antique dealers

were very satisfied with the cigars and cigarettes! In one of the last Facebook exchanges I had with Coy, he wrote that he just heard that Grandfather clock we had bought for them chime the hour and he thought of us and our time together in Germany. We thought and spoke of him often as well even from the long distance from Oregon to Michigan.

We send our sincere condolences to Kathy, Krista, and Melissa and their families.

RIP Coy, we will miss you but will never forget you!
