He accepted our 2 horses! What a blessing, an experienced horseman with a son and daughter who were equally experienced youngsters. Don was full of tips and always willing to share his knowledge. I remember once I was out of hoof ointment, Don gave me a homemade, tried and true recipe for making hoof ointment he'd used for decades. After graduation, I was going to the UW for graduate work in forestry, of course I wanted to take my horse with me...Don immediately offered to haul my horse clear up to Bothell, Wa. to the boarding facility. He was a man of integrity, courage, thoughtfulness and patience. I observed how his love of his son and daughter, gave him the strength to carry on after the horrific auto accident that took his wife's life, and nearly took his daughter's life. Don, I will never forget you. Thank you for being a stellar father, husband, teacher, horseman, and friend to all who were fortunate enough to have you in their lives.
