Doug worked as a Photography Instructor and Photo Studio Manager at the Oregon State University Craft Center. As the Director, I worked closely with Doug to develop our photography program. We had many conversations over the years. The Craft Center moved from Snell Hall this year to a brand new building- the Student Experience Center. A gorgeous new state of the art facility. With the move we were discontinuing our Black & White photography and going fully digital. Doug had been an active participant in the planning of 2 digital photo studios as part of our new center- this involved meeting with architects, project managers and construction engineers. Doug was excited to head up creating our new photo production studio for still work and video. When he was feeling well, he would spend time researching equipment; as items were purchased he worked with building facility staff to begin installation. We were all excited to see these studios develop and be used by students & staff.

Over the years, Doug has instructed & trained many people at the Craft Center. He taught our digital and advanced photo classes and really had an impact in developing talented new photographers- taking their understanding and skill sets to new levels. Current or former craft center instructors, learned or advanced their skill sets with Doug as a mentor. He was a generous, patient and passionate teacher, I know each held him in high regard and would want to pay their respects.

I knew Doug was a devoted son, we often spoke of our parents... my heart and sincere condolences to Catherine and other family members. I am so saddened I cannot bring myself to go into either of our two studios. I'm wishing for more time, more conversations, and more opportunities to view his incredible photographs. His photographic sensitivities and use of light were very special. I regret not taking a class from Doug...although to be perfectly honest I was always a little intimidated about the technical aspects of the medium and not wanting to seem inept in Doug's eyes, but it is my loss for not seizing the opportunity.
